From the desk of Pastor Mark Hollinger

Grace and peace to you in the name of our Lord, Jesus Christ. So what do you write in you first newsletter to the new church you've been appointed. I will start by letting you know that Kathy and I are very excited to be coming to you. We are packing up all of our stuff and we are up to our knees in boxes. Kathy has already made several trips over to the parsonage and has delivered some boxes in the parsonage garage. We will be packing up from Findlay on June 20th and moving into Cridersville on June 21st. Moving is fraught full of emotions, but mostly Kathy and I are excited in getting to know all of you and becoming a part of the ministries of Christ at Cridersville UMC. We have been blessed in the rapid sale of our house and the blessing of having such a large and well maintained parsonage awaiting us.

The Bible is full of people moving and being in transition. The Old Testament is set upon the backdrop of a couple moving and starting a new life. In Genesis chapter 12 we have the call of Abram (and by extension his wife Sarai) to leave the land of Haran, their homeland, and to move and take possession of a new land, Canaan. We remember this story and consider it a move centered in great conviction of faith. Abram hears God and moves away from what he knows to a new land and new adventure.

I just recently attended "A Right Start" session in which I and a team of five from Cridersville UMC attended to receive some best moves and practices for churches transitioning with new pastors. I appreciated having the support early on with five key members of the church and I look forward to employing those tools and practices as we get to know one another. Rev. Dr Scot Ocke facilitated the session and he started it by reminding us of the story of Abraham and Sarah and that they arrived and traveled as strangers in a foreign land and the implications of that for the United Methodist pastors who are about to move. But I didn't totally identify and correlate that comparison.

It's true that Kathy and I are coming to you as strangers and it is also true that we have never lived in Cridersville so it is a strange land but, I don't necessarily believe that this comparison carries as much parallel for the transitioning pastors and their families as it did 4000 years ago with Abraham and Sarah. We are all Americans with that common heritage and language and Kathy and I are from Lima so we are very familiar with Cridersville and the surrounding area. But it's so much more than that because we are all Christians and have Christ as our sovereign Lord and king. So we not only speak a common language and have connection and understanding of the culture of northwest Ohio, but we have a common purpose and mission—to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. That's exciting, challenging and binding.

As you move through the story of Abraham and Sarah we are reminded that God encapsulates their mission in this manner: "I have blessed you so that you can be a blessing to others" and this becomes part of who we are how we operate in the world and with each other. This will be the fourth appointment for Kathy and I in our twenty years of ministry and we have been blessed in each church with committed disciples of Jesus Christ and the leading of the Holy Spirit.

As Kathy and I prepare to move and form ministry relationships with you and the residents of Cridersville, we look forward to the flow of blessings and Christian work that will pass between us and among us at Cridersville UMC as the called and blessed of Christ.

Ch-Ki-Lo Food Pantry

The 'Stamp Out Hunger' food drive, conducted by the Postal Service, brought 1422 pounds of food to CH-KI-LO food pantry. That amount of food filled 36 banana boxes. Thank you to everyone who donated items for the drive and to those who helped with the actual work of the day.

Folks who come to the food pantry for assistance receive enough food, and some non food items, for 3 days. CH-KI-LO is a distribution site for West Ohio Food Bank Senior boxes, for clients over 60 years of age who meet financial qualifications through WOFB. A typical 'shopping list' for the choice food pantry includes – fruit, vegetables, peanut butter, jelly, canned meat, juice, soup, tomato sauce, canned beans, condiments, bathroom tissues, laundry soap, health and beauty items, dried beans, rice, macaroni and cheese, pasta, egg noodles, cereal, snacks, desserts, dried mixes (Hamburger Helper, potatoes, etc.), baked goods, shelf milk, frozen foods – meat, potatoes, mac and cheese, etc., eggs, bread, produce – potatoes, onions, apples, etc. The amount clients receive depends on the number of folks in the household. The pantry is open for 'shoppers' Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday mornings from 9:00 to noon.

While the pantry receives food donations, items must also be purchased to fill the needs. Generous monetary gifts from individuals, groups, churches and businesses enable the success of the pantry. Thank you to all who support CH-KI-LO Food Pantry by your many gifts!!


